# Four Things Every Parent Should Know Before Choosing A Dance Studio

If all dance studios in the area seem to have friendly teachers, experience teaching children and a big performance at the end of the year, aren't they all pretty much the same? Does it really matter which school you decide to choose? Yes, it does! There are 4 main things that can make a huge difference in the quality of instruction that your child receives. Here are 4 things that all parents should consider before deciding on a dance studio for their child.



# 1. EDUCATION OR COMPETITION?

It is important to ask the question of a studio, is your emphasis on education or competition? Dance originated as an art form, and when dance schools compete for trophies and "places" then it becomes a sport.

Our dancers' classical training is showcased in performances for the community as artistic entertainment. This allows our students to gain confidence through personal and physical growth. At our school, competitions do not define our students as "winners or losers". Our dancers are equipped with the technique and knowledge to continue their study of dance at a higher educational level if they so choose.



# 2. WHAT TYPE OF PERFORMANCE DO YOU HAVE AT THE END OF THE YEAR?

Is the emphasis of the recital the technique that has been taught over the year or is it a dance that has been practiced for the entire year? We don't start our recital dances until the beginning of February, with an emphasis on technique throughout the year. We choose tasteful and age appropriate costumes and choreography for all of our dancers. We want parents to feel comfortable and proud of what their children are presenting on stage. We feel the focus of the performance should reflect what the students have learned throughout the year.

# 3. WHAT TYPE OF DANCE FLOOR IS USED?

Dance is a physical activity that requires a lot of jumping, which can put stress on bones and joints. Most dance footwear does not provide any cushioning or support, so the shock of dance movement can put a lot of pressure on the dancer's back and knees. The best way to prevent against a potential injury is by choosing a studio with a professional "floating floor". A floating floor is a dance floor that rests on high density foam blocks to absorb the shock of jumping.

The top layer of a dance floor is also an important factor. A vinyl composite "marley" floor is accepted worldwide as the best surface layer for recreational to professional dance. A marley floor allows the dancer to "slide" without slipping. Few studios use professional marley floors in their studios and take one to their performance site and usually opt for a slippery wood floor.

All three of our studios are 1200 sq ft each equipped with floating floors that have over 700 high density foam blocks under the floor surface and a marley top surface. An additional marley floor is taken and laid for our school performances.



### 4. WHAT ARE YOUR TEACHERS' QUALIFICATIONS?

It is important to ask what training and background the instructors at the studio have. Dance instructors should have a college degree in dance or be pursuing one and/or professional experience. All of our instructors at the Ashburn Academy of Ballet either have a college degree in dance and/or professional experience.

Thankfully, the provisions to make Ashburn Village Boulevard and Gloucester Parkway 6-lanes have been dropped! Our combined efforts with our neighboring communities really made the difference. The turnout for our meeting with Chairman York, Supervisors Waters and Miller in May is a testament to everyone's deep concern and desire to keep our community from becoming divided and a casualty of poor planning.

The County's Chesapeake Bay legislation is gaining some momentum according to the local papers. Despite the multitude of back and forth rhetoric on the subject, one fact remains: there are no provisions for handling agricultural run-off or placing controls on the use of fertilizer and pesticides. The basic premise of this legislation should be to not only control development around perennial bodies of water, but also control what is unmistakably a primary root cause of water contamination. In order to preserve our home values and provide a modicum of hope for controlling pollution in our creeks, streams and rivers, this legislation needs to focus on the most important aspect of clean water and conservation, not arbitrary rules and restrictions on areas already developed. There is no doubt that we all want to do our part as a watershed area of the Potomac and Chesapeake Bay. However, we need to approach this in a smart and well thought out way.

The May 25, 2010 regularly scheduled monthly meeting of the 2009-2010 Board of Directors was called to order at 8:55 p.m. by President M. Doug Carlson.

Among other business:

- Approved the minutes of the April 27, 2010 Board of Directors meeting.

New Business consisted of the following items:

- Discussion ensued regarding Enforcement of Covenants on Public Streets. No action was taken.

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Executive Session Decision Item:

The Board took the following action regarding Condominium Notification to Withdraw from Pavilion Membership:

- Notify the Board of Directors of the two sub-associations of the options they now have about Pavilion membership.
- Require those Boards to submit a written notarized motion "electing to withdraw from sub-association membership in the Pavilion." The withdrawal must be submitted by September 15, 2010 and will become effective January 1, 2011. Individual homeowners will be able to purchase Multi-Family Memberships if they choose.
- In the absence of receipt of an election motion by the AVCA by September 15, 2010 as described in the paragraph above, the sub-association membership will continue as it is today.
- In the future, sub-associations may elect to change their options as they deem appropriate. These motions will be brought to the attention of the AVCA's Board at the next regularly scheduled meeting.
- All future changes will be effective on the first day of the calendar year following the year in which the AVCA receives the election notice.

### July 4th

Any firework that explodes, rises into the air, moves across the ground or shoots projectiles into the air is illegal to possess in Virginia. These devices include firecrackers, roman candles and pop bottle rockets as well as shell devices used at public displays. For a list of approved fireworks and additional information on the use of fireworks, please go to the Fire Marshal's website at: http://www.loudoun.gov/Default.aspx?tabid=1399.

If you do use any of the approved fireworks, please follow these safety tips:

- Never allow children to play with or ignite fireworks.
- Read and follow all warnings and instructions.
- Be sure other people are out of range before lighting fireworks.
- Only light fireworks on a smooth, flat surface away from the house, dry leaves, and flammable materials.
- Never try to relight fireworks that have not fully functioned.
- Keep a bucket of water in case of a malfunction or fire.

# Spider Flower Adds Old-Fashioned Punch to the Garden

Spider Flower (*Cleome hasslerana*) or cleome is native to southeastern Brazil and Argentina, making it a great plant for hot dry areas once it is established. This 3-4 foot erect plant has numerous, rose-purple, or white flowers with petals about 1" long and stamens 2-3" long. The spider-like effect of the flower is created by the abnormally long stamens. It blooms all summer long until the first hard frost and flowers continuously.

Some cultivars to try include 'Cherry Queen' (48 inches tall, cherry-rose flowers), 'Helen Campbell' (48 inches tall, white flowers), 'Pink Queen' (48 inches tall, pink flowers), and 'Rose Queen' (48 inches tall, rose-pink flowers and more colorful than 'Pink Queen').

Cleome is a flower that my grandmother always had in her garden, so I grow it in my own garden because it brings back fond childhood memories for me. It should be grown in sun to partial shade. While it grows well in hot, dry conditions, it also responds well to abundant moisture. You can propagate cleome easily from seed. For best seed germination, utilize alternating temperatures of 85° days and 70° nights and cover seeds lightly. Cleome also readily self-seeds in the fall. Leave the seeds in your flower bed, and see what

colors come up next spring -they may or may not be the same color as what you first planted! You may get more than you need from them self-seeding, but you can easily pull the ones you



don't want in the spring when they are small. Cleome is basically disease and insect-free. Uses for cleome include backgrounds, cut flowers or even a temporary shrub.

# July Monthly Gardening Tips

- Flowering dogwood (Cornus florida) commonly is affected by a number of diseases, including the fatal dogwood anthracnose. Protecting your dogwoods from drought stress can go a long way toward keeping them healthy. Make sure they have been mulched in a wide ring with organic material, about 3 inches deep (do not use dogwood leaves or wood as mulch, and pull back from trunk). During prolonged dry periods, water dogwoods thoroughly.
- During dry spells, trees may shed up to 10 percent of their leaves. This leaf loss helps reduce water lost from the tree by transpiration and causes little or no harm to the tree.
- Tip die-back of redbud (*Cercis canadensis*) may be caused by saturated soil. Redbuds are very intolerant of "wet feet" caused by prolonged wet soil and high humidity.
- Some woody ornamentals attractive to hummingbirds are crabapple, hawthorn, albizia, Siberian pea shrub, tulip poplar, buckeye, and horse chestnut.
- Inner leaves and twigs of trees normally drop from lack of sunlight, but falling clusters of leaves attached to short twigs may result from insect or squirrel activity. Girdling insects make shallow, encircling depressions, while twigs broken by squirrels have diagonally severed ends.

To make your vehicle a tough target, the National Insurance Crime Bureau recommends a "Layered Approach." The more layers of protection on your vehicle, the tougher it is to steal.

These Layers include:

- Common sense!
- Visible or Audible Deterrents
- A vehicle immobilizer.
- Tracking system

H.E.A.T. provides a 24- hour-a-day, seven-day-aweek toll-free number — 1-800-947-HEAT (4328) — for citizens to call and report information concerning the theft of vehicles, vehicle parts or chop shop operations. Callers may remain anonymous throughout the process.

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# **Mcgruff Safety Camp**

Every year Loudoun County Sheriff's Office Crime Prevention Unit and Loudoun Fire and Rescue hold a free week-long camp for kindergarten and first grade children. At this camp the children learn such things as fire safety, bike safety and stranger safety, among many other things. This camp has become so popular that Loudoun County Sheriff's Office has had to add 3 additional camps in the last 2 years. Even with this increase in class numbers the camp still fills up very quickly. This years camps will start the week of June 28th and continue until July 23th. # Q: Can I pass a school bus on a divided highway if I am going in the opposite direction of the school bus?

A: According to Code of Virginia section 46.2-859: If the road is divided by a median that is not paved you do not have to stop.

### Q: What are the laws relating to Moped's and mini motorcycles?

A: This question comes up a lot in the summertime. First, a moped is defined as - a vehicle that travels on not more than three wheels in contact with the ground that has a seat that is no less than 24 inches in height, measured from the middle of the seat perpendicular to the ground and a gasoline, electric, or hybrid motor that displaces less than 50 cubic centimeters. A mini-motorcycle is defined as a motorcycle that has a gasoline engine that displaces less than 150 cubic centimeters; has a seat less than 24 inches in height, measured from the middle of the seat perpendicular to the ground; and has no manufacturerissued vehicle identification number.

Both have laws regulating their use on roadways. The moped rules are:

- No moped will be operated on a highway faster than 35 mph. If operated faster than 35 mph the individual will be considered as operating a motorcycle.
- No moped will be driven on a highway by anyone under the age of 16 and every person operating a moped shall carry some form of identification.

The mini-motorcycle rule is:

# Mini Motorcycle



The Loudoun County Sheriff's Office would like to update the public with the laws concerning mini motorcycles, also known as pocket bikes. Manufacturers intended these vehicles to be operated on PRIVATE PROPERTY only, and not for use on a public street or highway.

Mini motorcycles can be powered by gasoline or an elec-

tric engine. While they are powered by smaller engines these vehicles can reach speeds of more than 35 mph.

Another thing to think about is safety. While on these vehicles the operators' head and chest are around the same level as a normal vehicle bumper. This would make even a smaller accident very serious.

A mini motorcycle is defined per the state of Virginia as a motorcycle that has a gasoline engine that displaces less than 150 ccs, has a seat less than 24 inches in height measured from the middle of the seat perpendicular to the ground and has no manufacturer-issued

VA state code 46.2-991.1. Operation of motor driven cycles on public highways is prohibited.

# The Dirty Dozen by Stephanie Hoaglund

There has been a lot of talk recently about pesticides and their effect on families. I recently watched a documentary called "Toxic America" on CNN and visited the related website which details the dangers of the chemicals that are used in our every day. From cleaning materials to the food we eat, they are everywhere.

Because my family has recently been changed by cancer, I now make a conscience effort to buy whole, fresh foods when possible and in particular, organic produce. The President's Cancer Panel has recommended that consumers buy pesticide-free produce to reduce the risks of cancer and other diseases. Also, although the government says that small amounts of pesticides pose no measurable health risks, there are some studies that show a correlation between pesticides and many health problems like cancer, ADHD and weakened immune systems. Did you know that even washing produce before eating it doesn't rid it of pesticides? Many times the chemicals are in the water, which can mean the pesticide is actually inside the fruit via the soil.

So, how do we, as the consumer, navigate through our local stores to figure out what to do? Organic and specialty food is usually expensive. I don't know about you, but I am not made of money *<can you hear your mother saying that?>* and feeding a family of 4 can really add up. So here are some tips, which have helped me figure out how to make the best choices for my family.

### What produce should you buy organic?

Focus on certain fruits and vegetables that have higher pesticide levels. I have learned that the thicker the skin of

the produce, the less of a pesticide concern there is. So when deciding which foods to buy organic, focus on the fruits and vegetables called "The Dirty Dozen" because they were found to have the highest level of pesticides per serving:

Celery Peaches
Strawberries Apples
Domestic blueberries Nectarines
Sweet bell peppers Cherries

Potatoes Imported grapes

Lettuce

Spinach, kale and collard greens

Then there are those fruits and vegetables that are considered "safe" and contain little or no pesticide contamination. You can be fairly confident when buying the non-organic option. These fruits and vegetables are known as the "Clean 15" and include:

Onions Avocado
Sweet Corn Pineapples
Mango Sweet peas
Asparagus Kiwi fruit
Cabbage Eggplant
Cantaloupe Watermelon
Grapefruit Sweet potatoes

Sweet onions

One of the great things about living in Ashburn Village is that we have many farmers' markets nearby. There are at least 5 markets every weekend that are

within reach. Farmers' markets are a great place to buy organic fruits, vegetables and meat and support local farmers. Visit the Loudoun Farmers' Market website (www.loudounfarmersmarkets.org) for information on location, times and what they have available each week.

# **Junk Food Dog**

A woman called me the other day, frantic that her six month old Labrador puppy, Max, was choking. I asked her if Max could have gotten into anything. She said Max had been eating a rawhide bone a short while earlier. I told her to check in the pup's mouth, and I heard her shout, "Oh, my gosh!" She was able to get her hand down the dog's mouth and hook her finger behind a large piece of rawhide wedged in there. Luckily, she was able to dislodge it. This woman and Max were both very fortunate. What if that had happened while Max was left alone?

Dogs get into all sorts of stuff they shouldn't, but quite often they are given things they shouldn't have. Like every good dog owner, you want to make your dog happy, but how do you discern which toys and treats are safe? Some owners give their dogs just about anything under the sunfrom worn out shoes and socks to steak and chicken bones left over from dinner. Others may pick out any toy that looks cute. Both groups unknowingly put their dogs at risk for choking, intestinal obstructions, or stomach and

pancreatic infections, any of which may cause death.

Stuffed toys, socks, towels, in fact anything that can be torn apart, can potentially be swallowed and cause problems. I've seen dogs swallow socks whole and need them surgically removed.

What about rawhides, pig ears, or Nylabones? Rawhides are usually well-tolerated, but they may cause stomach upset, or become a choking hazard as mentioned earlier. It is best to observe your pooch if you give him or her one. Pig ears are trouble. Although dogs seem to love them, I've seen far too many dogs become very ill after eating them. Nylabones can also be dangerous. Made from nylon, these knobby bones are supposed to stand up to chewing, but if a dog bites off a large enough piece, this indigestible material could spell danger.

What should you leave with your dog to keep him or her occupied while you are gone? Provide only sturdy toys that won't shred, break up or be swallowed whole. When it comes to dog toys, one size does not fit all.

P.S. Marrow bones are good, but make sure to boil them for 3-5 minutes to kill off any potentially dangerous bacteria.

### Fitness Tip from AVSP Fitness Director, Tracy Faber:

### **Monitor Your Heart**

Keeping track of your heart rate is important because it helps you monitor how hard you are working and helps track your fitness progress. If you are not working in your target heart rate zone, which varies for everyone, then you are either working too hard or not enough. In addition, monitoring your heart rate helps you track your current fitness level and progress. The more "fit" you are the less time it will take to bring your heart rate down to resting level after a workout.

# **Ashburn Village - The Next Twenty Years**

### History

Twenty-two years ago the first homeowners of Ashburn Village settled on their homes and moved in. A few short years later the housing market crash of 1990 catapulted the original developer into bankruptcy and ushered in Chevy Chase Bank as the new owner/developer of the property. During the next seventeen years, the development of the community saw many collaborative endeavors among the homeowners and "The Bank". But more importantly, people within the community capitalized on opportunities to improve and enhance vital components and create new ones.

The development of Ashburn Village pioneered what is accepted today as the norm for new development in Loudoun County. The various amenities that dot our subdivision such as the schools, commercial property, recreation centers, pools, tennis courts, trails, parks, common spaces, ball fields, lakes and more define our landscape and provide us with shape. However, one additional amenity, the Sports Pavilion, truly sets Ashburn Village apart from our neighbors and makes us a different community. The Pavilion is not only an amenity that must be maintained, but also an integral community element that must keep pace and evolve with the changes our subdivision will continue to experience.

### Research

Beginning in 2008 the Board of Directors authorized the formation of a committee to explore renovation and expansion of the Sports Pavilion, and solicited for homeowner volunteers to serve on the committee. Over the next fifteen months the committee worked with several consultants, other standing committees and interviewed many users of the Pavilion along with their neighbors and acquaintances. They reviewed the physical layout and design of the facility and the property. Analysis of current program offerings was completed in order to gain a full understanding of the inner workings of the facility and where improvements were warranted. Surveys were sent out to assist in identifying user pain points and to gain a perspective on what the participants of the facility wanted to see improved or changed. The facility and program review, coupled with user feedback, created a working list of not just renovation and expansion objectives but also areas of operational improvement:

- Improved method of entry
- Expanded cardio, fitness, weight and group exercise spaces
- Self check-in capabilities
- Better on-line access to information and program offerings
- More space for adults and equipment
- Family Locker Room facilities
- Dedicated Youth Activities space

- Expanded Indoor Pool space
- Tennis support facilities (bathrooms, controlled entry, storage)
- Additional Parking
- Interior facelift (fixtures, paint, flooring, etc.)

Simultaneously, the association's Finance team analyzed the income and expenses associated with programming, annual facility maintenance, utilities expenditures and our contractual obligations for the daily operations. This effort has created a solid foundation of the total financial picture within the facility and how we can implement and leverage a new operations model over the next few years. The subsequent operational savings and program profits will be reinvested to assist in financing the revitalization/renovation efforts.

### Refinement of Scope

Throughout the later stages of the process, meetings with the community were held to solicit further input and gauge community reaction to several design ideas. As a result of those meetings and additional analysis, the project scope changed significantly. Original plans for a second gymnasium, a large community space and a permanent indoor tennis structure with a parking garage were removed. A concern of many meeting attendees was the impact on assessments and overall home values and resale potential with the long-term debt service associated with the project. While the practice of borrowing money by the association for long periods of time (20 years or more) is not new and is still in place today, the initial price tag for many homeowners was enough to create a moment of pause, especially during the economic times we recently faced.

The committee and our consultants used this input to further narrow and refine the scope and focus on the areas that would still provide core value within a renovated facility while simultaneously limiting the overall cost. These efforts have produced a phased approach to the renovations and will limit the annual capital expenditure for each phase until all renovations are complete. Effectively, this will eliminate the need to borrow money long-term and still provide the association's premier asset with a much-needed facelift. This phased approach for improving community assets is already in place for the landscape revitalization project that began in 2008.

### By the Numbers

The association has spent approximately \$180,000 to date in the exploration and development of the available options to improve the facility. The money expended was used to professionally facilitate the process, develop conceptual drawings and floor plans, develop space planning models for equipment and conduct meetings with homeowners, consultants and the County. All of the intellectual capital

created during this stage of the effort will be reused as the project progresses. The monies that financed this portion of the project were a combination of equity reserves (contributions by the developer for each lot sold and developed) and homeowner assessments. This expenditure was part of both the FY09 and FY10 budgets.

In order to maintain a sustainable, fiscally sound approach to the renovations, each phase will be limited annually to no more than 10% of the association's budget for that year. Based on the average budgets for the last two years, this would equate to roughly \$750,000 to \$800,000. Annual funding for this amount would be a combination of program profits, reinvestment of savings gleaned from operational changes within the facility, Reserve money set aside for the facility and homeowner assessments. Given the boundaries outlined, a granular breakdown of the direct cost to the average homeowner is in order.

A portion of the monthly HOA assessment paid by homeowners goes to support Pavilion operations. In 2010, this monthly amount is \$26.82. With a cap on each stage of the renovation not to exceed 10% of the annual HOA budget, current projections anticipate that the portion of the monthly HOA assessment supporting each phase of the Pavilion renovation will be \$5 - \$15 on an annual basis. These annual increases will not be cumulative; in other words, the increase in the portion of the monthly HOA assessment to support the Pavilion renovation will not exceed \$15. Initially the assessment increases to fund early phases will be somewhere in the middle to upper end of that scale. The assessment amount will be added to the Pavilion Capital Improvement budget every year through the entire renovation period. As we implement operational changes within the facility, the savings will also be directly invested into the project. Those savings, combined with profits from the program offerings and the homeowner contribution will provide the capital for each phase. Eventually, when all phases are complete, the savings will continue to be reinvested into the operations of the facility to keep assessment increases at a minimum.

An example of how a typical homeowner's monthly assessment might be affected is as follows:

### **Scope**

The phased approach to the renovations is the most economically sensible method to implement the desired changes. Each phase has specific intentions and the timing of each will build upon the previous one and in some cases create the foundations for the next. While we cannot state unequivocally at this time what all of the phases will comprise, we do know the basic outline of the proposed renovations. Those proposed changes/enhancements are:

- Construction/relocation of a new parking lot-level entrance
- Construction/relocation of new racquetball courts
- Construction of family locker room facilities
- Construction of new indoor pool observation area
- Construction of a tennis support facility
- Replacement of the tennis bubble (funded through Reserves already in place)
- Reconfiguration/Additional parking
- Reconfiguration/Renovation of reclaimed interior spaces for youth activities, cardio, weightlifting, group exercise, childcare and existing locker room facilities

Optionally, the construction of a semi-permanent structure to cover the Pavilion outdoor pool is under consideration. The operational schedule of the indoor pool for open swim, swim lessons, group exercise and swim team practice, will be reviewed and overhauled with the goal of creating more opportunity for all levels of participation. The need for a second indoor facility will be carefully studied and implemented when warranted if operational changes cannot produce satisfactory coexistence of offered programs and homeowner desired use.

The order of implementing the changes has not yet been determined, but steps are being taken to begin defining the scope along with the sequencing of the various components. The committee is drafting an RFP to solicit design firms for the development of the required site plan and architectural and engineering drawings. While the design phase will take place in FY11, the RFP process to select a design firm will take place in FY10 between July and September. The goal is to limit this element's cost to between \$200,000 - \$400,000.

With the reuse of the intellectual capital already developed, this amount is certainly achievable.

Ashburn Village has positioned itself as a sustainable forward-thinking community. The many decisions taken over the years have framed who we are and the type of community we will remain. Whether you examine our self-managed philosophy, our self-funded expansion of the Lakes Recreation Center, the self-funded purchase of the Visitor's Center, the 5-year landscape revitalization plan and many other projects, the renovation of the Sports Pavilion is the next step in our community's commitment to the future of Ashburn Village.






